#### Text C

To succeed in school, children must master three skills: reading, writing, and arithmetic. Still, not all students readily grasp these basic skills. Between 2% and 15% of English-speaking children have reading or spelling difficulties broadly classified as dyslexia. Dyslexia often shows up as difficulty in decoding words and recognizing sounds. Additionally, 1% to 17% of English-speaking children struggle with math, a condition known as dyscalculia. Statistics vary, but dyslexia appears to be more common among English speakers than among those who speak highly phonetic languages such as Turkish and Italian. It is

estimated that at least one child in most elementary school classes in the US suffers from dyslexia. Both dyslexia and dyscalculia defy easy explanation. Neither disorder is the result of faulty eyesight or hearing, both of which can also delay language acquisition but are easily corrected. Instead, children with dyslexia and dyscalculia have working sensory organs, apparently normal sensory and motor development, and sometimes, above-average intelligence. In affected children, even though the eyes and ears accurately register sights and sounds, the brain misinterprets letters, numbers, and spoken syllables during processing.

#### Text D

- (I) Sigmund Freud was an Austrian neurologist and the founder of psychoanalysis, a clinical method for treating patients through dialogue. He listened to his patients and assessed their thoughts. Freud believed that having someone to listen to helped people deal with problems. By talking things out, people usually feel better. This idea has become known as "the talking cure." Today, psychologists still utilize it.
- (II) Freud developed many hypotheses about human thoughts, feelings, and the workings of the mind. He studied people with mental health issues. Most of his patients felt tense and were unsure of the sources of their stress. Freud assumed that he could find the answers by listening to them and analyzing their dreams. (I) Many influential female authors have used male or gender-neutral pseudonyms (pen names), for various reasons: to avoid gender bias in male-dominated literary circles, to experiment with anonymity, o to appeal to male readers.
