Montessori Philosophy

- Aim of Montessori education is to foster competent, responsible, adaptive citizens who are lifelong learners and problem solvers
- Learning occurs in an inquisitive, cooperative, and nurturing atmosphere. Students increase their own knowledge through self-and teacher-initiated experiences.
- The physical, emotional, social, aesthetic, spiritual, and cognitive needs and interests are inseparable and equally important.
- Learning take place through the senses. Students learn through manipulation of materials and by interacting with others. These meaningful experiences are precursors to the abstract understanding of ideas.
- Respect for oneself, others, the environment and life is necessary to develop a caring attitude toward all people and the planet.

Components of a Montessori Adolescent Program informed by current research

- multi-aged groupings of 12-15 year-olds
- large blocks of uninterrupted learning time
- peer and cross-age teaching
- trans-disciplinary themes
- long-term cooperative learning projects
- a strong sense of community and social interaction with peers
- meaningful and challenging work
- activities for self-expression, self-knowledge, and self-assessment
- activities that value all nine intelligences and a variety of learning styles
- activities to foster interdependence
- school and community service projects
- activities that allow work on and with the land



Students are expected to:

- Schedule time for their work and use class time efficiently
- Review lessons and readings
- Keep up with their planner & work graph
- Participate in lessons and class activities
- Collaborate with their assigned groups for group projects
- Submit or review assigned work according to guidelines
- Curate work and create portfolios
- Come to school prepared to learn
- Per FCPS Policy, come to school dressed appropriately



Parents are invited to:

- Maintain daily conversations about work progress
- Review their child's work graph each week and sign
- Volunteer as chaperone for field trips (must complete training)
- Help their child to pack their own lunch and snacks
- Assist with perspective-taking about conflicts and coaching about proactive problem-solving
- Celebrate accomplishments and help their child keep a positive outlook!



Middle School Teachers will:

- Provide cycle guidelines to students at the beginning of each cycle (six-week period)
- Give rigorous lessons and learning opportunities
- Review assignments due
- Regard your children with respect and care
- Answer student or parent emails within 48 hours (does not include weekends)

Middle School Program

Math:

• Students will receive math work based on their level that is designed to help them scaffold and build a progressively higher understanding of mathematics.

Language:

 Students will receive lessons and language work on their study guides. Vocabulary study, literary analysis, reading, and writing work will be assigned. Students will also be asked to participate in discussions.

Natural World:

• Students will receive science lessons and assignments on their study guides. They will have individual and small group assignments, some of which will lead to presentations to the larger group.

Social World:

• Students will receive lessons and social studies work on their study guides. They will have individual and small group assignments, some of which will lead to presentations to the larger group.

Middle School Program, continued

Health & Wellbeing:

• Students will receive lessons and have weekly time to do personal reflection activities to enhance their social-emotional growth and their understanding of themselves as integral parts of their community.

Project Work:

Students will be involved in individual and group projects as assigned in their study guides. They will follow a
normal rhythm of project work with readings, research, and discussion groups.

Practical Life:

 Middle School students are encouraged to be active participants in their classroom. This includes activities like cooking, cleaning, and running a business. Also included will be community service work. Students will be expected to keep up with all work.

Immersion Weeks:

Ouring this time, electives, workshops, personal projects, or community service projects may be offered. Some of these will be designed by the students themselves, and some will be curricular areas not covered in the traditional cycles, such as health or personal finance.

Absences

Lawful Absence - Students shall be considered lawfully absent when absent from instruction with proper documentation approved by the principal/designee.

Unlawful Absence - Students shall be considered unlawfully absent when absent from instruction without submitting an absence note to the principal/designee.

Grading

Grading follows FCPS regulation 500-05. Students will receive letter grades.

The purpose of grades is to provide feedback to students, parents, and educators about student performance and achievement in school courses of study. Grades (letter or number) are assigned during the report card term for assignments, projects, quizzes, and tests. They are also assigned at the end of the report card term as a formal grade on the report card to represent achievement for the entire marking term.
