

TWO REMINDERS FOR WHY FINDING FREE MONEY IS IMPORTANT

Direct Fees

(tuition, dorms, meals)

+

Indirect Fees

(transportation, entertainment, health insurance, special sheets for dorm, computer, pizza on Sundays, etc.)

Class of 2019

- Avg debt = \$31,172
- Avg Monthly student loan payment for graduates = \$393
- Time to pay off student debt: 10 to 30 years

**This will only estimate how much you would get through the FAFSA from the government. Colleges may give <u>additional</u> funding based on your FAFSA information. You won't be able to estimate this. This information will come with your award letter in January of senior year. Colleges determine Work Study.

College - Automatic (GPA/test scores)

Google a college name + "scholarships" and check out your college's automatic scholarships based on GPA and test scores

Specific Examples:



Automatic: Awards from \$2K - Full Ride based on test scores and GPA



Professional: NFIB Young Entrepreneur Award. \$2K to someone who operates an established business



Charity: The Ronald McDonald House Charities US Scholarship Minimum 2.7 GPA, Community Involvement and Essay



Employer: Fred & Lena Meijer Scholarship. \$3K Scholarship for those that work at Meijer/child of employee

THE BEST PLACES TO FIND SCHOLARSHIPS

- Automatic Scholarships from Colleges based on Merit (test scores and GPA), and/or Need
- FAFSA Application
- College Financial Aid Websites
- Local Scholarships (see weekly eblast, GPS Mothers Club, and Naviance) and local businesses/organizations
- Web Based Scholarship Search Sites
- Google Searches

MAXIMIZING AUTOMATIC SCHOLARSHIPS

- 1. GPA
- 2. Test scores (always accept the highest!)

Ask for references in advance	Set your own deadline 5 days ahead of the real one	Postmarked vs. Received by

How to Keep Organized (and Sane)

- Watch deadlines
- Follow all instructions
- Start a Google spreadsheet shared between parent and student?
- Keep a file of scholarship information and copies of your applications
- Set up a separate gmail account JUST for scholarships

GOOD JOBS FOR PARENTS

- 1. Check out FAFSA on-line: https://fafsa.ed.gov/
- 2. Read the daily bulletin for you
- 3. Research scholarships but agree upon when and how often to review list!
- 4. Organize scholarships in a spreadsheet or in another way
- 5. Share a Pinterest board on scholarships, dorm room decor, open house
- 6. Make a shopping list for college and watch for sales, deals, yard sales
- 7. Proof read college applications and scholarship essays
- 8. Set up job shadows
- 9. Set up and attend college visits
- 10. Complete the FAFSA (and SSI as appropriate)



NOT....

- 1. Apply to college
- 2. Write your essays
- 3. Go on job shadows or interviews with you
- 4. Write your thank yous for you
- 5. Keep track of deadlines for you
