






My Family Tree







Use of English: Apostrophes 's and s'

In English we use apostrophes to show that something belongs to somebody or something. The boy's book.


The apostrophe shows the reader that the book belongs to the boy. Notice the difference between apostrophe s ('s) and s apostrophe (s'):

- apostrophe s ('s) shows that something belongs to one person or one thing
- s apostrophe (s') shows that something belongs to more than one person or thing.
