Accessibility Mindsets

Access Benefits Everyone

	Permanent	Temporary	Situational
Touch	 One arm	 Arm injury	 New parent
See	 Blind	 Cataract	 Distracted driver
Hear	 Deaf	 Ear infection	 Bartender

Context

- What is purpose of your visual?
- What message is being conveyed?
- What does the audience *need* to know?

Simplicity

- Audience needs to **understand** the information
- Keep it simple and predictable
- Succinct and concise alt text

Flexibility

- Provide information in **multiple forms**.
- Users have the **flexibility** to engage with it the way they want!



Alternative Text

Examples & Applications

Image Alt Text

- The text “behind” the image
- Based on context of usage
- Provide concise meaning
- Remove images with no purpose or mark “decorative”
- Don't use images of text

What should I put in the alt text?

Keeping in mind **context** + **simplicity**, think about including...

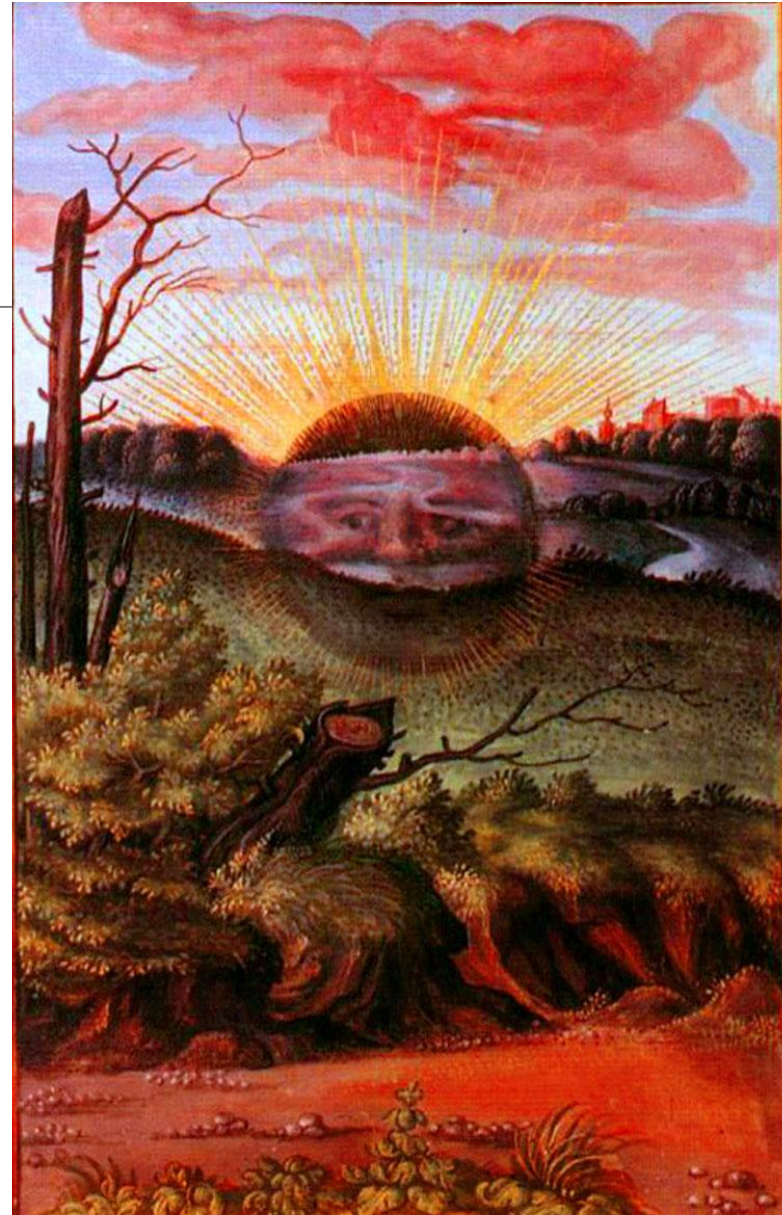
- Type
- Who
- Setting
- Color
- Emotion
- Interesting details

If the image does not provide important information, you can write “null” or mark as decorative

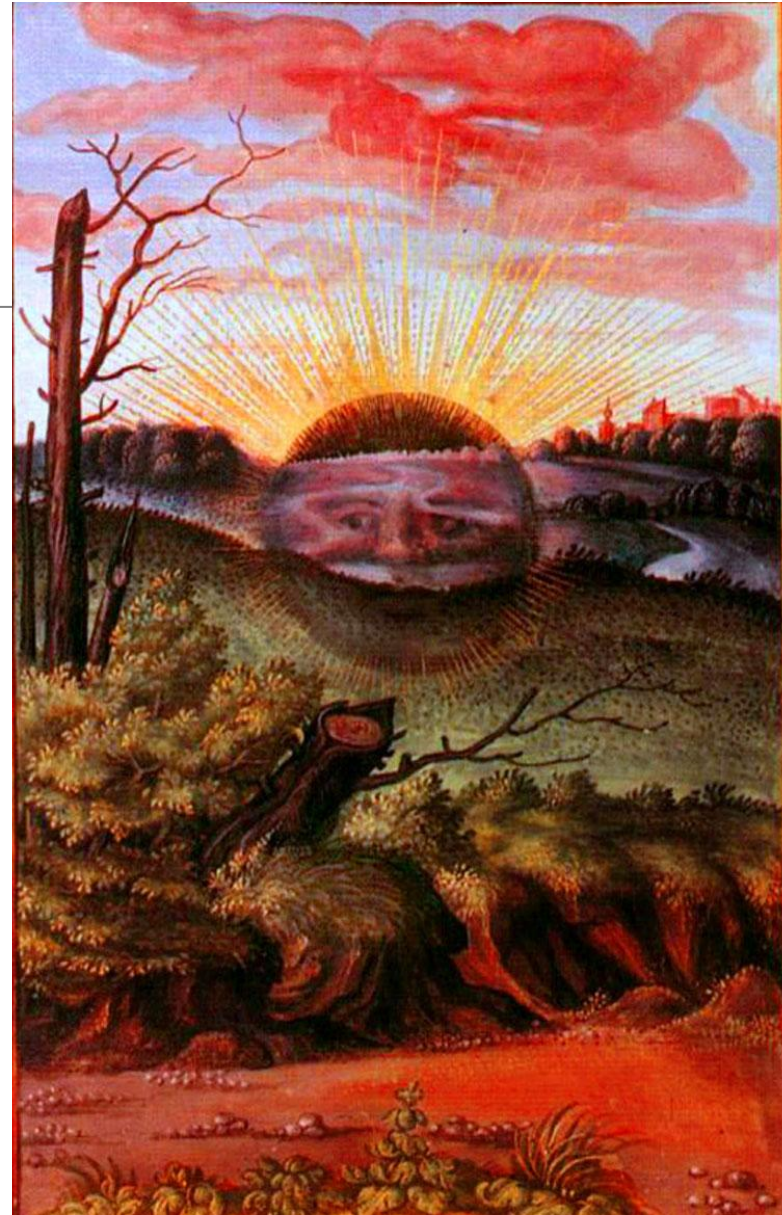
Example 2: Description

Artificial Intelligence and Alt Text

Alt Text

How would you describe this object and its context to someone who is blind or low vision?

- The subject(s) in detail
- The setting
- The actions or interactions
- Other relevant information

(1-2 detailed sentences recommended)

Description automatically generated

Mark as decorative [i](#)

[Give feedback on this alt text](#)



Image Descriptions

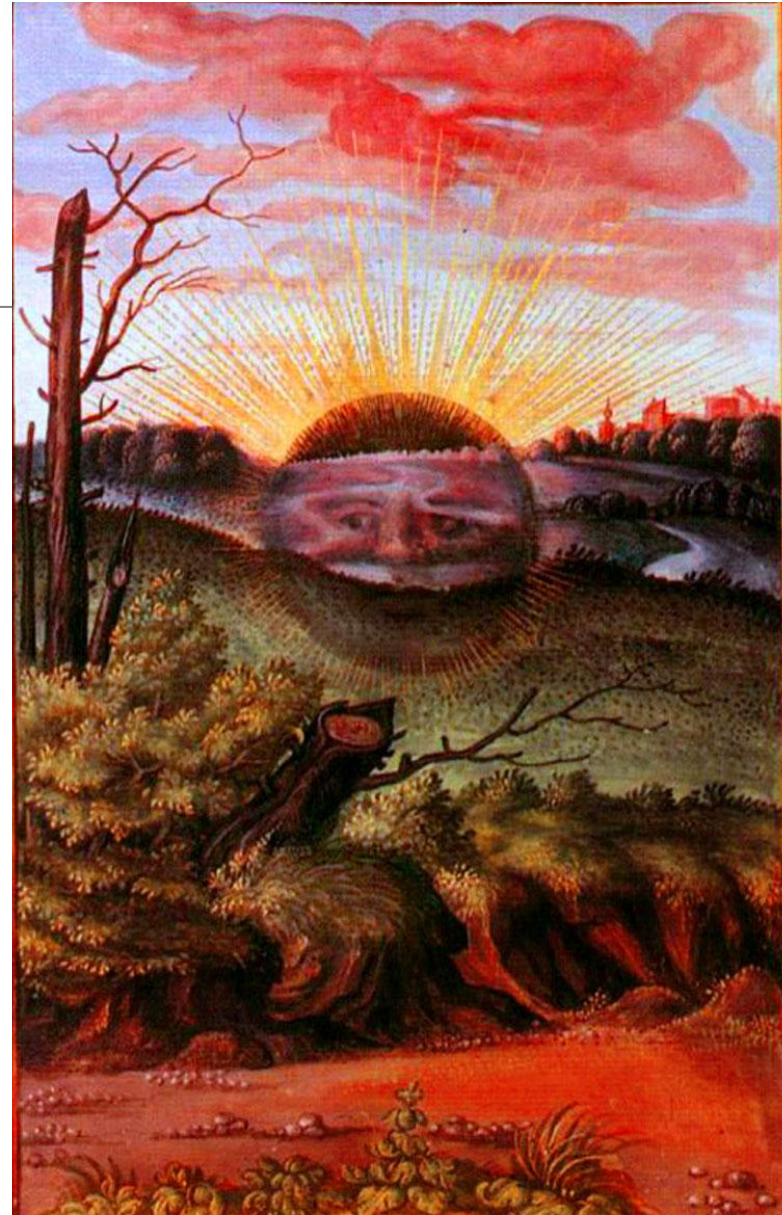
Examples & Applications

Image Description

- Like alt text, they textually describe a visual
- Unlike alt text, they are...
 - Part of the standard text
 - Visible to all users
 - Typically more detailed
- If you have a particularly complex visual, you might need a more detailed description

A Familiar Example

Dark Sun, a page from the *Splendor Solis*, an alchemical illuminated manuscript by Salomon Trismosin (ca. 1582). It depicts a green landscape lit by the red light of dusk or dawn. 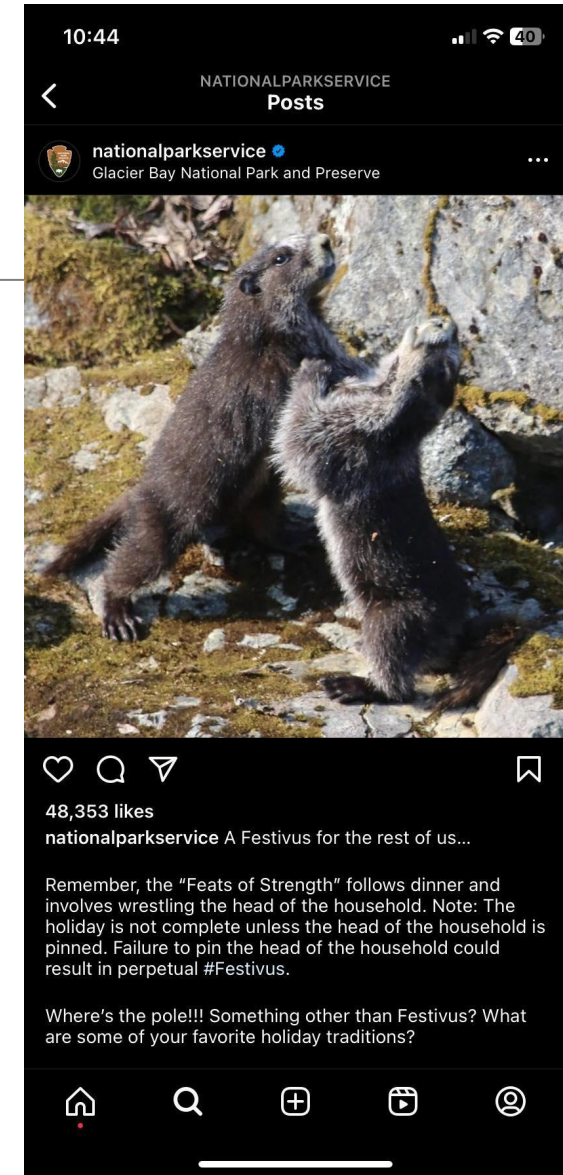


Example: National Park Service

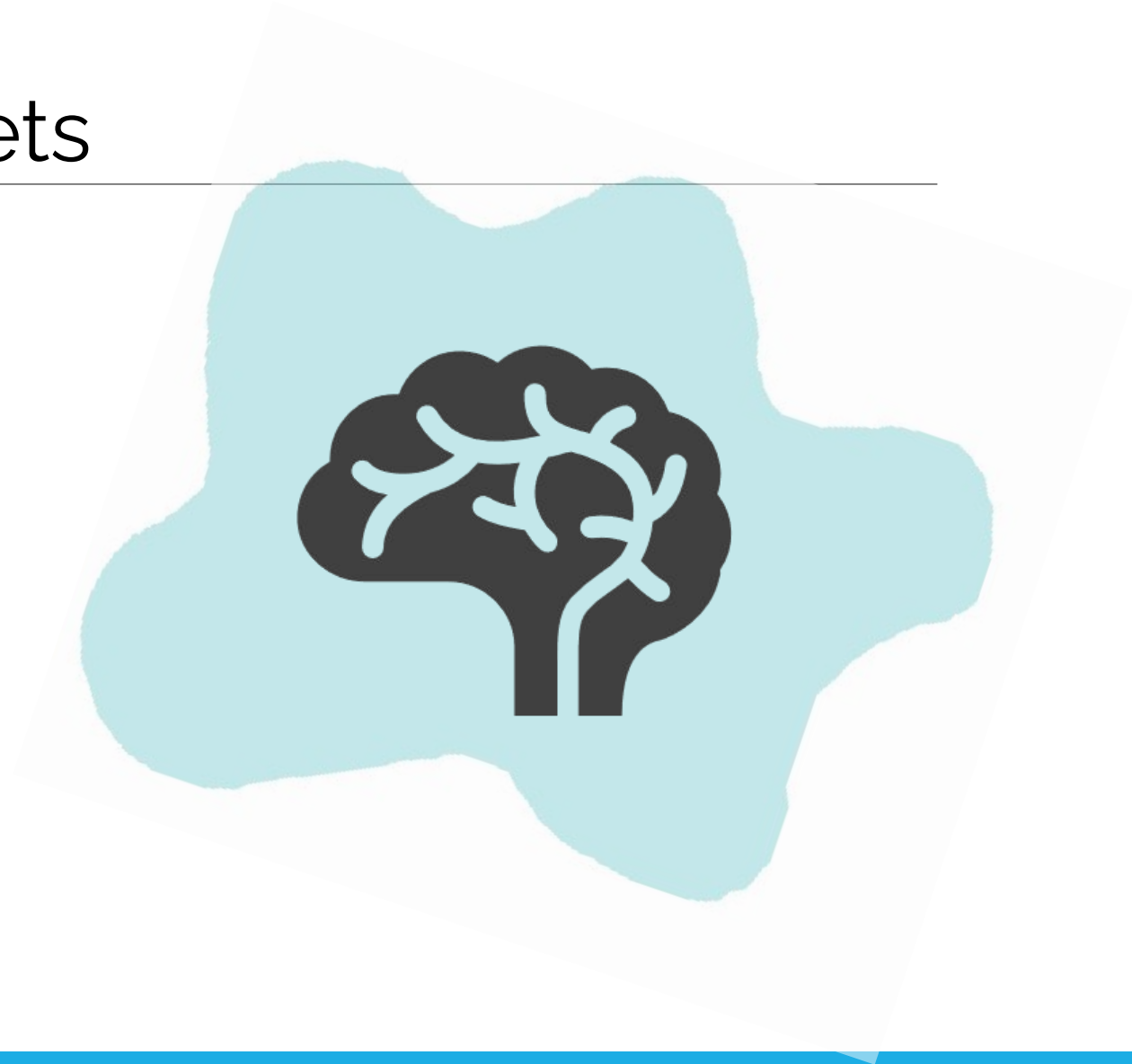

Alt Text vs. Image Description

	<i>Alt Text</i>	<i>Image Description</i>
Location	Attached to an image's metadata	Part of the text
Visibility	Used by screen readers	Viewable to any user
Length	~125 characters or less	More variable
Detail	Key information	More in depth if needed
