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

Cory, the boys camp of the YMCA of Rochester and Monroe County has had a long and successful history.


This success has been achieved through the many fine staffs throughout the years. They have dedicated themselves in providing you with activities to develop the best in Spirit, Mind and Body.


FAIR





WATER CARNIVAL






SAILING

ATHLETICS








John Beehee, Senior Waterfront Director and Ed Donohue his assistant held forth down on the waterfront this year at camp.

There responsibility was a big one—capably handled and executed to provide the maximum amount of enjoyment on the Waterfront which is indeed the most important of all camping activities.


