## Early to 1950s (black and white): Dorothea Lange





Dorothea Lange (May 26, 1895 – October 11, 1965) was an American documentary photographer and **photojournalist**, best known for her Depression-era work for the Farm Security Administration (FSA). Lange's photographs humanized the consequences of the Great Depression and influenced the development of documentary photography. Working for the Resettlement Administration and Farm Security Administration, Lange's images brought the plight of the poor and forgotten—particularly sharecroppers, displaced farm families, and migrant workers—to public attention.

- 1) The subject is a woman. The art element conveyed is shape/form.
- 2) I see hard light as the shadows on the woman have harsh lines.
- 3) The subject is placed to one side of the picture. The composition I see is balancing elements as the woman's visual weight is balanced with the visual weight of what appears to be a large bucket.
- 4) F/5.6, 1/20 sec, ISO 100, 35 mm
- 5) The message is that those who migrated during the Great Depression were stressed because of their difficult economic situations.

Tina Barney (born October 27, 1945) is an American photographer best known for her large-scale, color portraits of her family and close friends. The images straddle the line between candid and tableau photography. Although the wealthy became a sort of aesthetic in Barney's work, her "fascination is with the repetition of traditions and rituals. The idea that families no matter where they come from, kind of do the same thing." Barney's work is in the Museum of Modern Art in New York City, and the Museum of Contemporary Photography, to name a few.

- 1) The subject is a woman. The art element conveyed is shape/form.
- 2) I see reflected light as light is reflecting off of the TV.
- 3) The subject is placed to the center of the picture.

The composition I see is framing as attention is drawn to the woman as the TV frames her.

- 4) F/22, 1/20 sec, ISO 100, 18mm
- 5) The message is that the woman comes from a wealthy family as her pose suggests she is well off; the arms across her chest.

1) The subject I see is ice cream. The art element conveyed is texture.

- 2) I see hard light as the shadows on both the ice cream, and the surface it's on, have harsh lines.
- 3) The subject is placed to the center of the picture. The composition I see is cropping as the bowl of ice cream has one side cut off. This helps to cancel out noise.
- 4) F/5.7, 1/20 sec, ISO 200, 55 mm.
- 5) The message is that the icecream is important as the background is cropped to showcase it.
