

Lacrosse Returning to the Olympics

World Lacrosse's decades-long vision to return the sport to the Olympic stage has been realized, with the International Olympic Committee approving lacrosse's inclusion in the 2028 Olympic Games in Los Angeles. The Olympics will feature the Sixes discipline, a fast-paced version of lacrosse played on a smaller field (70 x 36 meters), with fewer players (6 v 6), a condensed game length (four 8-minute quarters), and a 30-second shot clock.


Exploring Native American Stories

- 5. Allow students to write a written response to the story using the writing prompts in myON


