



- 1. Do brainstorm and outline before you write your paragraph!
- 2. Every paragraph has a topic sentence.
- 3. Every paragraph has a conclusion sentence.
- 4. Every paragraph has support sentences with transition words.
- 5. Indent every paragraph at the first line!


