



Core Components Theory of Knowledge

Here's a diagram showing the different elements of the TOK course, which we use as different contexts to explore questions and about knowledge.



TOK - what do we do in class?

Today's TOK Moment: There is a global race for a Covid-19 vaccine, i.e. Operation Warp Speed

How do we ethically test it in people?

Can people be forced to get the vaccine?

Who should get it first?

What ethical constraints should there be on the pursuit of knowledge?

TOK Assessment

Examples of TOK Exhibition prompts:


What counts as knowledge?

How does the way that we organize or classify knowledge affect what we know?

What is the relationship between knowledge and culture

Example of a TOK Essay title: "Accepting knowledge claims always involves an element of trust." Discuss this claim with reference to two areas of knowledge"

Core Components Extended Essay 'EE'

A 4,000 word One year Research project Dissertation Thesis

A very independent project **BUT** never alone. 1:1 specialised supervisor

Difference Between IB Courses and IB Diploma

Rather than taking the full IB Diploma, students may opt to take a variety of IB Courses and earn certificates from the IB in these classes.

IB Course candidates are not required to take EE, TOK

CAS is required from everyone as it is an ISB graduation requirement





IB Course Assessment

- Most subjects are assessed through Exams (70%) and coursework (30%)
- All subjects are graded on a scale from 7-1
- The Extended Essay and TOK offer 3 bonus points
- Maximum of 45 points
- You need a minimum of 24 points to get the IB Diploma*
- There is a wide range between 24 45 points!
- IBDP is accessible to a wide variety of learners

Assessment in the IB

- External Assessment assessed by the IBO
- ✓ Internally Assessment (IA) assessed by the ISB teacher (with IB checking ISB Grading)
- ✓ All subjects have Internal and External assessments
- ✓ IB Information for Students & Parent <u>here</u>

Core Components - TOK / CAS / EE

- 1. Theory of Knowledge (ToK)
 - a. Exhibition in Gr11
 - b. Essay from a prescribed list of titles in Gr12

- 2. Extended Essay
 - a. Research paper (4000 words) in a subject area of the student's choice
- 3. CAS
 - a. Portfolio of experiences in ManageBac
 - b. Reflections of experiences

No matter which pathway students choose, all students will received an ISB Diploma.

Students will also receive certificates from the IB for any courses they complete through the IB.

Students who complete the IB Diploma will receive this in addition to the ISB Diploma.

Grade 11 & 12 Options

Opting for the Full IB Diploma versus creating their own program of studies, is a personal choice that should reflect the BEST FIT for each student

Colleges How are IB Courses and the IB Diploma Recognised?

- Worldwide recognition:
 - Australia, Canada, Europe (Netherlands, UK, etc.), Japan, Korea, U.S., etc.
- IB students undertake one of the most challenging education programs and courses available to them... Universities know this
- The IB supports universities and higher education institutions to explain their policy on admitting IB students
- Possible credit or advanced standing depending on country and/or university
