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Components of an Interview

Etiquette of an Interview

- Contact your subject days or weeks in advance and have a date in mind.
- Be sure to introduce yourself and the purpose of the interview to your subject before and during the interview.
- Do not interrupt your subject while they talk.
- Be ready to listen more and talk less.



Interview Questions

- Ask open-ended questions
 - Ex. "What was that like for you?"
 - "Like" questions gives the subject an opportunity to recollect something by what the see as significant
- Ask subjects to tell a story that involves a topic within a topic you want to ask your subject.
- Be looking for ways you can follow up your initial question if the answer you get is vague.
- Keep your questions simple and have them progressively become more complex.

Conducting an Interview (Follow Up Questions)

- Ask questions when you do not understand
 - Ex. "Can you tell me again when that happened?"
 - Request for clarification
- Ask to hear more about a subject
 - Ex. "What do you regret?"
- Explore, don't probe
 - Too much or ill-timed exploration of the participants words
- Avoid leading questions
 - Ex. "Did you really mean that?"
 - Ex. "How satisfied were you with your student teaching placement?" →
 "What was your student teaching placement like for you?"

What Look For During the Interview

- Changes in body language in reaction to certain questions.
- The environment like when you conducted your interview.
- Your subject's reactions to certain questions.
- Questions that worked and others that didn't.
