In partnership with PASE, <u>Loup</u> is facilitating a process of **collective reflection** and ideation around the last decade of Hive work.

This will include, **celebrating** Hive members and achievements, **documenting** and reflecting on what Hive has created, and **generating ideas** and recommendations around what's next.

As part of this, we're hosting a **Hive NYC Design Lab** on July 17th, as well as two **annotatathons** — one before, and one after
the Lab. This deck explains what those are,

step-by-step **tutorials** to make it easy for you
to join in.

Exploring Hive NYC stories for meaning and ideas

An annotatathon uses **Hypothesis**, a social online annotation tool, to create an **online space** where readers can think about and discuss a text. It's a way to get together — each on our own time — to identify and explore meanings, ideas, and values. It should feel like a good **conversation** — with a bit of a chaotic. flash mob vibe. Annotatathons take place over a set period of time — what we're calling a "sprint". You can join anytime during the sprint, even right at the end.

Preparing for the July 17 Hive NYC Design Lab

Sprint #1 will last two weeks (July 2–13) and will feed into what we do together at the **July 17 Design Lab**, surfacing themes and ideas for how we document and celebrate the Hive NYC's achievements over the last 10 years.

Shaping documentation and recommendations

Sprint #2 will last three weeks (July 23 – August 10) and will inform the **documentation, recommendations, and prototypes** that Loup prepares for PASE.

Three easy steps... then GO!

1. Sign up for a free Hypothesis account.

The first step is to **sign up** for <u>a free Hypothesis account</u>.

2. Join the HiveNYC annotation group.

Next, join the HiveNYC group.
This is a private group and will allow us to capture our annotations, comments, and tags as a set.

3. Highlight, annotate, tag, and reply.

Pick a mission or start free-form annotating and tagging on any HiveNYC story. The following pages have step-by-step tutorial instructions.

Join anytime and go at your own pace.

This is not an all-at-once Twitter overwhelming chat. You can do a bit at at time, and take time to think, and come back later. Enjoy!

A few tags to get you started

Pick a tag, or create your own!

On the right are a list of tags you might want to use as you start reading.

Once you start reading, **if you want to add a tag just do it.** Go for it! After the sprints, the Loup team will go through all the tags, group similar tags, and clean everything up.

If you want to help out, you can jot down what the tag(s) you added mean(s) for you as part of your annotation.

Go with your gut; we'll take care of the rest.

Your mission, should you choose to accept it...

1.

Tag or comment

Pick one or more <u>Hive stories</u>, select some text, and tag it (be sure to post to the Hive group and not Public — see tutorials that follow). You can also annotate to note why it is significant, Annotations can contain links, and you can embed images or videos. If you like, you can also add a "meta" note or tag an entire story (vs selected text).

2

Join a conversation

Go to the <u>HiveNYC Group</u> and pick an **existing annotation or tagged text**. Start or join a conversation using the "reply" feature.

3.

Share _your_ story

Select some text on any Hive story that resonates for you. Share your story — something you've experienced that relates to the text.

4.

Invite someone else

Invite a friend or peer to join the Hive Annotatathon! Send them the group link and this deck and they're set.


Visit <u>StoryEngine.io/Hive</u> and select a story. For this example, we've picked Gigi's story.

Hypothesis appears on each page (we had it pre-installed). Access it by clicking the < symbol...

...The Hypothesis area will slide out. Select Sign up or Log in to annotate or tag any text you select.

If there are any Public annotations they will appear here. (We will be using a private Hive group.)











After you've signed up to Hypothesis. Go to https://hypothes.is/groups/gX1rQZJG/hivenyc and join the HiveNYC group.

Now you can view group notations and start annotating, tagging, and commenting / replying as part of the group!










Reply to or share a note. You can link directly to this specific note by copying the URL specified in the "share" menu. This is useful for connecting comments across texts / web pages.

In 2014, I started working for the Learning Portfolio project at Parsons, Pre-College


Academy. We developed a hybrid course for high school underserved students to help them develop learning portfolios so they could prepare digital portfolios to apply for art school.


Click "Annotate" and the right-hand Hypothesis side bar will open so that you can make notes or add tags (see next slide).


