






Alberto Giacometti was a Swiss sculptor who was interested in the human figure. Many of his sculptures are of people.



When you look at this sculpture, what do you see?


Giacometti always made his figures look very tall and skinny. Why do you think he did that?



STEP ONE: Pull out a sheet of tin foil. With a marker, draw 2 lines along the top edge in equal parts. Draw 2 more lines dividing the two sides in half, and on the bottom edge, draw one line dividing it in half.

See example

STEP TWO: Start scrunching foil into limbs and head, going slowly so you don't tear the foil. Once it starts taking shape, pose your figure. What is your tinfoil person doing? Does it look like Giacometti's figures?

### **Drawing Duels!**



Today we're going to curate our own museum!



A Curator at a museum is someone who is the caretaker of a museum's collection. They also choose pieces of art that go together and create exhibits for the public to view.







Today you will curate your own exhibit! You can choose some of the art you've been making at home OR you can find a collection of something you have (objects that are alike).

STEP ONE: Gather your artwork together OR find a collection of something you have at your house.

STEP TWO: Arrange your artwork on a wall or along a table or however you think it looks best. If you have a collection, arrange your objects on a table or other surface. Does your arrangement look interesting? What could you change to make it more interesting?

STEP THREE: Make a sign telling the people visiting your exhibit what your exhibit is about (Make a TITLE).







STEP FOUR: Decide where you want your visitors to start and end their tour.

STEP FIVE: (This is optional) Make tickets for your visitors.

STEP SIX: Open your exhibit!



# This week in art! **Amelia Aviators** At Home Drawing Duel!


Hi everyone! We've recently been watching Pixar Animation Studio YouTube videos of professional artists having DOODLE DUELS. These are so fun to watch because they are the artists responsible for creating your favorite characters and scenes in the movie world! Check out the video on the next slide for a fun watch. THEN, follow the instructions to have your OWN DRAWING **DUELS** with your family!



**WATCH THIS** 

#### **Drawing Duel for 2 or more people:**

- Step 1. Write some of your favorite CHARACTERS, PLACES, OR THINGS from movies on strips of paper and put them into a basket, hat, cup, or bowl.
- Step 2. On other strips of paper, write some other ideas such as "day at the beach" or "lost in a forest" or any other PLACES you can think of. Put them in a separate basket, hat, cup, or bowl.
- Step 3. Write ACTIVITIES such as fishing or skateboarding and put them into another basket, hat, cup, or bowl.



Step 4. Have someone pull one slip of paper from each cup. Now you have a CHARACTER, PLACE, and ACTIVITY for your drawing duel.

Step 5. Set a timer for 5 or 10 minutes--you decide. Then ready...set...go!

Andy Goldsworthy is famous for his nature art. He <u>observes</u> various <u>environments</u> or places, and <u>gathers</u> the things nearby to make art in its natural habitat.













## Inspired by Becky Cooper's "Map Your Memories"














# Inspired by Becky Cooper's "Map Your Memories"

In the project "Map Your Memories," artist Becky Cooper traveled across her hometown Manhattan and met hundreds of strangers in an effort to get to know her neighborhood and the people around her. She gave these strangers blank maps of the island and asked them to fill them in with whatever best captured their experiences of the city.

In response, she received hundreds of small pieces of art, each perfectly capturing a different individual. For this project, you will interview members of your family to learn about their memories and experiences in your hometowns, and create maps to capture their experiences on paper.

from high school. All like a dream.





## **Directions**


- 1. Create a blank map of your hometown in your sketchbook. Keep it minimal, in a pencil or black pen outline, with just a few major roads, parks, or landmarks.
- 2. Interview at least 2 members of your family, or anyone who is near you that you are close or familiar with.
- 3. Ask them questions such as:
  - a. What are your happiest memories here?
  - b. Where do you spend most of your time?
  - c. Where did you meet your significant other?
  - d. What's your favorite about about this place?
  - e. What's your least favorite part about this place?
- 4. Along with this family member, fill out the blank map with that person's memories. Get creative with how you fill it out! Color it in, make it into a collage, etc. Just make it special to the person whose memories you are mapping!


### 2. CREATE A MAZE IN YOUR SKETCHBOOK


