<b>General Qualities</b>	"The Great Pyrenees dog breed's goal in life is to protect sheep, goats, livestock, people, children, grass, flowers, the moon, the lawn furniture, bird feeders, and any real or imaginary predators that may intrude on your personal space. Oh yeah, and to give, give, and give unconditional love. Anyone who has seen this stunning white dog becomes enamored. What's not to love? He has a strong build, a beautiful, thick coat, and he exudes elegance and majesty. One look and you can see the intelligence and steady temperament that many seek in a family dog." "The Kuvasz is a large, white flock-guarding dog who hails from Hungary. A one-family dog, he's protective of his people and suspicious of strangers. The Kuvasz thinks for himself and can be challenging to train."	"A Kangal Dog is a livestock guardian breed. Kangal Dogs will threaten or possibly kill predators or animals they believe might be predators. Kangals cannot be expected to calmly welcome uninvited human guests on your property. Kangals are gentle and trustworthy with their people or animals, but if the need arises they will become very protective. You cannot trust this breed off leash unless you live somewhere extremely remote and you've done extensive training to ensure that your dog will not disappear after a deer or stray dog. You will need reliable fencing, often taller and more robust than you think. Some Kangal Dogs have climbed 6 foot fences. Good fencing is not optional – it is a requirement for this breed."

Adult Kuvaszok are gentle and patient with children, but puppies can be too rambunctious for young kids.

That may sound kind of cool until you stop receiving mail and your friends refuse to come over."			"The Kuvasz can be a wonderful, loyal, and patient companion, but he's not for everyone. Because he was bred to guard, he can be aloof, independent, and suspicious of strangers. Your Kuvasz will be polite to welcomed guests, but no more – regardless of how hard the strangers try to befriend him. His almost fanatical loyalty makes him very protective; he's always alert for any signs of danger, and when aroused, he can move with surprising speed given his size."

He will bark even more at night because of his extraordinary senses of sight and sound, which enable him to detect coyotes, deer, wolves, raccoons, bear, and possum (all of which must be protected against). His vocal styling will definitely scare them away and keep the family and property safe.
