The Rogers Creek Nature Trail follows a creek leading to a deep pool, view of shale cliffs & a waterfall. The paths connect to a more extensive trail system of the historic Log Train Trail.

<b>Geographical Description</b>	Along Rogers Creek in Port Alberni.
<b>Area/ Trail Length</b>	2.5 km one-way along creek.
<b>Seasons to Visit</b>	Year-round. Spring for flowers.
<b>Habitat</b>	Riparian, second growth forest.
<b>Viewing Highlights</b>	Spring flowers. Large cedar trees. Culturally modified trees.
<b>Other Features</b>	Shale cliffs. Swimming pool . Waterfall at end of trail. Remnants of water engineering infrastructure.
<b>Main Access</b>	From junction of Highway 4 & Port Alberni Highway at the Visitor Information Centre, follow the south fork (Port Alberni Highway) for 1.4 km to the trailhead sign & small parking area.
<b>Secondary Accesses</b>	<a href="#">Map</a>

<b>Cautions</b>	Trails may be wet. There is no bridge across Rogers Creek at the Log Train Trail. Bears are common in spring, summer & fall.
<b>Jurisdiction</b>	Crown Land and Crown Land woodlot.
<b>Regulations</b>	No motorized vehicles.
<b>Facilities</b>	Parking area. Bridges, occasional bench. Trail signage.
<b>Other Recreational Activities</b>	
<b>Other Connections</b>	Access to the Log Train Trail. Burde St. Ponds trails to the south.
<b>History</b>	Rogers Creek was the source of drinking water in the early days of Alberni (the older of the two communities that have now amalgamated into Port Alberni).
