With minimal elevation and boardwalks on some trails, this park is a suitable hiking location for people of all ages and mobility. Geographical Description	Francis/King Regional Park is located adjacent to Thetis Lake Regional Park just on the south edge of the Highlands. The entire forest is relatively flat and is mostly dirt and plants, there are no specific rocky features.
Area/ Trail Length	Area: 107 hectares
Longui	Trail: The entire area is an easy hike with over 11 km worth of different trails. The ground is relatively flat with a few wooden bridges to cross over ditches and muddy spots. One trail is mostly accessible boardwalk. The longest hike in the area should only take 2-3 hours.
Seasons to Visit	Visited year-round, but best to go during spring when rare wildflowers are in bloom.
Habitat	Old growth forest

Viewing Highlights	Due to the age of the forest, some of the largest Douglas firs (up to 75 meters, up to 600 years old) can be found here; Garry oaks, Grand firs, arbutus, red alder, and bigleaf maple trees also grow in this park. Wildflowers and other plants found here include common camas, salal, horsetail, shooting stars, white fawn lilies, indian plums, and licorice ferns. Birds include Dark-eyed Junco, Anna's and Rufous Hummingbird, Barred owl, Great Horned Owl, MacGillivray's Warbler, and Hairy Woodpecker.
Other Features	
Main Access	Located 20 minutes (11 km) from downtown Victoria by driving. Take the Trans- Canada Hwy (Hwy #1) out of Victoria, exit towards Burnside Road West. Continue driving straight uphill and turn left on Prospect Lake Road. Turn left on Munn Road, and the parking lot will be on the right.
Secondary Accesses	
Cautions	During wet seasons like fall and winter, trails may be muddy and slippery, walk with caution with appropriate footwear.
Jurisdiction	Capital Regional District
Regulations	Dogs must stay on leash. Do not remove or disturb animals or plants. Smoking, camping, open fires, and alcohol are prohibited.
Facilities	Parking lot (fits 17 vehicles), picnic areas, toilets (by the parking lot), nature center, water fountains, information kiosk.
Other Recreational Activities	Hiking, cycling
Other Connections	Some trails connect to Thetis Lake Regional Park and eventually, Mill Hill Regional Park.
History	Named after Thomas Samuel Francis and Freeman King, Francis donated the land that now comprises Francis Park to the province upon his death. A separate property was added to the park in honor of Freeman King, a good friend of Thomas Francis.
	Before becoming a park, the land Francis lived on was his families homestead which was established in the mid-1800s. Due to the abundance of large trees in the area, may people sought to pay Francis large sums for many for access to the timber. However, he refused, wanting to keep the forest in its natural state.
